

Gun-Free Zones: A Second Look

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SAMPLE

- Participants recruited via personal Facebook pages.
- Data collected using an online survey via Qualtrics.
- Anonymous participation.
- Age 18+
- Varying degrees of education and income levels.

RESEARCH QUESTION & HYPOTHESES

- Is there a relationship between criminal gun violence and gun-free zones?
- People who believe that gun-free zones increases the risk of criminal gun violence will be more likely to favor lifting gun-free bans than people who do not believe that gun-free zones increases the risk of criminal gun violence.
- Gun owners will be more likely to say that gun-free zones increase the likelihood of criminal gun violence than non-gun owners.

MEASURES

- Age (years)
- Gender (male/female)
- Marital Status (single/married/divorced)
- Do you have personal defense firearms for protection? (yes/no)
- Are you a Conceal Carry Weapon Permit Holder? (yes/no)
- Opinions about gun-free zones (level of agreement; 0-10, with 0=strongly disagree and 10=strongly agree); see figure for questions



RESULTS

- People who have personal firearms for defense have higher mean level of agreement with the statement that "gun-free zones increase the likelihood of criminal gun violence (*M*=7.12, *SD*=3.50), compared to people who do not have a personal defense firearm (*M*=3.28, *SD*=3.43), *t*(48) = 3.91, *p*<.01.
- There is a strong positive correlation between agreeing that gun-free zones increase the likelihood of criminal gun violence and likelihood of voting in favor of eliminating gun free zones, r = .743, p < .01.



DISCUSSION

- Mixed levels of support for lifting gun-free zones or adding more gun control laws.
- Both sides of the issue want the mass shootings to subside but have differing ideas of how to get it done.
- Future research is needed to look at alternative ways of securing schools and protecting. children from violent offenders.
- Findings from Arnold (2015), states that Utah does not have gun free zones and have never had issues with mass shootings in their schools throughout the state.
